Cruising further afield

You can follow Steve Powell and his Swan 62 Uhuru of Lymington, on their voyage to the Southern Hemisphere on Steve's blog. I can thoroughly recommend it - to quote from Steve's email

Well with only a couple of days to go now before I head off back to UHURU and start again on our epic journey to sail around the world, not only the "Longest Way Round" but also the "Wrong Way Round", I thought I'd take the chance to 'take stock'. My plan is to depart Grenada about the 1st October and start heading south down the East Coast of South America. We will visit Guyana, Suriname, Devils Island, French Guiana, Brazil, and Argentina before heading down to the Falkland Islands for Christmas.

After Christmas I will be joined by brother Mike and Richard Haworth, the Ice Guide, from High Latitudes who has also been involved with the build of UHURU from the outset. We then set off for a months cruising down the Antarctic Peninsula, starting at Elephant Island of Shackleton fame. While we're down there we plan to do a little diving, a little skiing and a little climbing. We will also visit one of the Ice Stations. We then head back across Drakes Passage and around the Horn. We might end up going around the Horn twice as we then need to get back up to Ushuaia, to pick up new crew, before going through the Beagle Channel and up the Chilean Archipelago. From there we

head up to Robinson Crusoe Island, Peru, the Galapagos islands, across to Mexico arriving in Los Angeles some time early July.

Assisting me in this 16,000 nautical mile voyage in some of the most challenging waters in the world will be a host of family and friends all of whom you and I will get to know very well in the coming months.

It all sounds so easy in a email.... then we go here, then we go there, etc, etc,. But I'd be naive if I thought that we won't be challenged in some way, many many things can go wrong, and I hope I've planned for every eventuality. But the truth is you can't. The real challenge will be how we deal with the set backs and until we face them we'll never know.

Junior Sailors

Harken Youth Classes Regatta

The first day started with fickle winds and race officer Pete Bell took the fleet to the west side of Pennington Post to find space away from the other fleets out racing. There was a big range of experience; for some more used to inland sailing, getting to the start was they furthest they had sailed, but the tide was with them and they all managed to get there. The wind eventually settled to about 8 – 10 kts from the west, and a short course was set with a true beat up to the finish giving opportunities for tactical racing. Three races were run in each of the fleets. In the third Laser Radial race Tom Britz on port shot in from a foot off the start line at the pin end but then had a tacking duel with Olly Porter right up to the finish, which Tom won with inches to spare. Ailsa Muskett surprised herself and others by popping out at the start of the first Laser 4.7 race, she picked up the shifts correctly on the last race, which she duly won.

Sunday's winds were stronger with a solid westerly at 16 kts all day gusting to 25kts. Two laps of the big windward/leeward course gave more opportunities for tactical sailing both on the beat and the run. This gave the Cadet fleet, who were competing in the Southern Zone qualifiers, the opportunity to show the selectors they could sail in varying wind strengths. Some of the less experienced sailors enjoyed the hospitality and hot chocolate of the mother ship, but all stayed to watch the racing even if the wind was too strong for them. In the Radials Tom Britz sailed conservatively, taking third place on both Sunday's races with Olly Porter and Robbie Urwin battling for the top two spots.; Jamie Diamond nailed 4th place overall only 14 months after leaving the Optimist fleet. He also did a successful port tack start on the other three in the last race!

Final results in the 420 class had three crews on 8 points but Tim Gratton and Ed Riley won with two firsts and a second, ahead of Mike Wood and Hermione Stanley followed by Joanna Freeman and Ben Gratton. Tom Britz won the Laser Radials with Olly Porter just second having had two wins to Tom's three, Robbie Urwin coming third. Hannah Muskett won the Laser 4.7 with Bradley McLaughlin second and Rafaella Quinton third, one point ahead of Ailsa Muskett after the discard. The Cadets were won by Andrew Smith and Rory Burdock with Jack Wilson and Ryan Wikinson 2nd and Will Davis and Jack Colling 3rd.



Nick Thompson, recently runner-up in the Laser World Championships, came to present the prizes together with Sue Perry. He also passed on a number of tips to the competitors, and showed himself to be very adroit at fielding a range of questions, from - what's it like to capsize in the last race of the World Championships to what's your exercise regime and what do you have for breakfast.

All in all an excellent weekend's racing in tricky conditions and many thanks to the volunteers including many parents and Harken for their support.

XODs

The Lymington XODs have had some fantastic sailing this summer with a record number of races sailed (only 2 cancelled due to too much wind) and on very light wind days our Race Officers always managed to get a race completed with some shortening of courses and occasionally setting short windward/leeward courses close inshore. 19 Saturday races and 22 Wednesday races, not to mention the 14 Thursday evening races. Many thanks to the loyal XOD Race Officers for successfully running so many races. Don't forget the XODs have still got the Autumn Series of 8 races through October.





September saw the Bobby Bongors W/L Regatta when the Yarmouth fleet are invited for this series in memory of Bobby Bongers who did so much for the Lymington Division over a period of some 10 years. The

Race Officers wisely delayed the first start to allow the forecast light Westerly to set in. Once the racing was started the efficient race team, who had set a good course, kept the competitors on their toes with minimum time wasted between races which resulted in all three races being able to run their full length. With a fleet of 24 boats and a not too long start line, starting skills were at a premium. Neil Payne from Yarmouth demonstrated in the first and last race just how to do it, but came unstuck in race two when he was forced the wrong side of the committee boat, an error that almost certainly cost him the series.

As it was James Meaning another Yarmouth sailor sailed consistently well to take the series with Lymington sailors Adrian Summers and John Olliff-Cooper, second and third. The second race in this series was also the final race in the six race Allott Cup open series. Ado Jardine & Paul Fisher in Lucrezia led Neil Payne & Steve Lawrence in Lizz Whizz into this last race by one point, the position they maintained to win the series. James Meaning finished third in Venus.

The annual long race to the west, postponed from August owing to inclement weather, saw 15 XODs come to the starting line for a race

into Christchurch Bay on a fine Wednesday afternoon. A strong ebb with a consistent moderate SW wind made for a fast beat to windward on the tide led initially by Beatrix X178, Bill Dunsdon, who made a perfect start at the windward end of the line. The first and only mark was the North Head buoy off Milford on Sea beach which was to be rounded to starboard before a run back to the Lymington river entrance to finish at the Royal Lymington club finishing line. Mayday X161, David da Cunha, was first to round 50 minutes after the start, closely followed by the rest of the fleet. The spinnaker run against the last of the ebbing tide took just under an hour saw Xray, X117, Robin Balme, cross the finish first, closely followed by Red Coral, X57, Robert Young, in second place with Diana, X164, Rory Paton, third. Surprisingly only 4 minutes separated the first fourteen XODs.

Whilst Will Heritage was cleaning up at first the Bosham Oppie Open, with 3 bullets from 3 races, and the following day exactly the same again at Chichester, seven of the girls were up at Cardiff being coached by Alan Williams, the National team coach. Meanwhile 40 sailors took full advantage of the first of seven weekends which will be run through the winter by Ben Muskett and his team from the Olympic Development Squad.

We then travelled to Datchett for the South Zone Indicator, that is an open meeting where the sailors are battling it out for a lot more than just their place on the day; they are aiming to win a place in the RYA's highly competitive South Zone winter training squad. 68 sailors will battle it out over three weekends to decide the 24 squad places. The competition included national squad and Worlds Team sailors and the time had come for our young sailors to square up at the top level. Fortunately they gave a very good account of themselves, with Vita Heathcote posting 4th, 5th, 3rd, 5th to claim 4th overall, closely followed by Millie Boyle and Hattie Rogers.



In rather too buoyant spirits we then went down to Weymouth for a full weekend of Zone Championships. It was a real buzz mixing in with literally hundreds of other sailors – windsurfers, Laser 4.7s, Toppers and Mirrors, all having their own trials and tribulations on their journey for a place in the RYA squad. And in amongst it all an Ironman (1900 m swim, 60 mile bike, 13.5 mile run) was taking place, which some of the dads (not this one!) bravely – or perhaps rashly, had a crack at. Perhaps next year. A harsh northerly wind kicked up some confused waves which the square-bowed Oppies struggled to deal with, but the weekend ended well with the first 18 of the squad places being snaffled

up by 14 of our own. After an evening spent climbing on the sea cliffs of Portland we trundled back to Lymington with a Land Rover full of exhausted but very happy sailors. It has been a tremendously satisfying season, with almost too much fun and too many good results. Can there be such a thing?
