Chesapeake Bay Cruise



The cruise was the final event of the Sailing Club of the Chesapeake's 2015 cruising programme, with over 20 boats taking part at various time and other members joining events by car. We crisscrossed Chesapeake Bay and visited some delightful anchorages. 16 Club Members joined their hosts on eight boats for a truly memorable event. The American hospitality was outstanding and we've all made new friends.

The tone was set on our first day, at the US Naval Academy in Annapolis when Members and their hosts were entertained to lunch at the Officers Club and then given a tour of the Museum led by the Head Curator. The warmth of the welcome was wonderful and the tour – especially of its collection of ship models, brilliant. The curator's favourite ship model is that of the 1733 90 gun 2nd rate HMS Princess Royal. Very appropriate for the Club.

Next day we sailed to Gibson Island, north of Annapolis for the first of many parties. The weather

was warm, the sunset from the Gibson Island boat house terrace memorable and cocktails, canapes and dinner all excellent.

Our hosts, the Sailing Club of the Chesapeake have an annual "Race for the Broom" team race against the Gibson Island Yacht Squadron in 1950's built 210 class three crew day boats. Each 210 had an Club crew member (Fenella Lees, Brian Appleyard and Tim Knight) and SCC duly came home victorious. The other memorable contribution to the day was the on the water commentary from Roger Wilson. A number of SCC members commented that it was the first time they had every understood team racing.

Team racing over we then moved into cruising proper with an overnight anchorage and raft party in the Rhode River, a couple of days in Saint Michaels, a perfectly tranquil anchorage in Baby Owl Cove and a night in Oxford on the Tred Avon river. Saint Michaels included a tour (again led by the curator) of the Chesapeake Bay Maritime Museum and the Oxford overnight stop featured a dinner at the Tred Avon Yacht Club. We sailed between 3 and 5 hours between each of the stops. Winds were between 10 and 20 knots and two of the day sails included mini passage races for the SCC Medway trophy. The final stop was in Harkness Creek but forecasts of a 40 knot NE'ly caused some boats to break off for their home ports early and join by road.

The cruise ended with a 'Fish Fry' at the home of one of the SCC members on Harkness Creek, although those able to stay an extra day were treated to a tour of the Smithsonian Museum maritime artefacts and papers – again led by curators and an impressive lunch at the Washington Press Club.

Cruiser Racing

September saw a flurry of late activity amongst our cruiser racers to conclude the season. The Thursday night racing was extended with an experimental 4-race 'Late Late' series for Cat 4 cruisers only. 18 boats split equally into two Lymington Adjusted Handicap classes enjoyed some of the best racing of the whole summer. In LAH1 Ben Vines' J80 Purple Haze won a close contest while in LAH2 Sarah Boles' nicely presented and very well sailed High Potential, fresh from her victory in the Contessa 26 Nationals, was a clear winner. The consensus was that this was a successful experiment and should become a fixture in future years. Many thanks to all those race officers who made this series possible.

The 2015 Duo series concluded on 26th September with 15 boats sailing around the Shingles in very light conditions. This event has proved extremely popular with 33 boats having competed in at least one of the six races. The formula of having a three race mini-series in the Spring and another mini-series in September also contributed to keeping boats and crew interested. The highlight was an Around the Island race from Lymington on 5th September which thankfully was sailed in almost ideal conditions and enabled all the boats to get back safely and in good time. We must look to making this a regular event in future series. Sandwiched in between was a very blustery race around the Western Solent on 12th September. Overall winners were - IRC1 Jelly Baby (William Newton), IRC2 Ephesian (Emma Gage/Stuart Brand) and LAH High Spirit (Andy Maskell). The September mini-series winners were Jin Tonic (Andy Roberts), Seahorse (David Cowell) and Unity (Richard Truscott) respectively.

The Saturday Cruiser series ran its fourth and final race on 19th September. This series suffered from a disappointing turnout and very light winds in two of the races. However, Allan Hill's J30 Colleen was a popular and deserved winner overall. Many thanks to the XOD race officers who helped start most of our Duo and Saturday Cruiser races.

These included his father John, who in the last race rolled back the years, making a great start and pulling out a commanding lead, only to have the pursuing pack catch up in the light shifty conditions, and for Robbie (disobeying team orders!), to overtake to win and give him a clean sweep of firsts. John however managed to hold out to take second and clinch 2nd overall.



Robbie repeated his success at Staunton Harold reservoir in the British Moth nationals. With five ex national champions in contention it was never going to be easy, but he won seven of the nine races clinching the title with the day to spare. It was also a successful week for local sailmaker Pete Sanders who designed and supplied sails for two of the top three boats, a notable feat as this highly competitive class is a showcase for most of the top names in dinghy sail making.

To complete the hat trick Robbie teamed up with his father to take the scourge of the Monday evening medium handicap fleet, the Seafly, to Blakeney Sailing Club in Norfolk for their Seafly Open event. The new boat proved very competitive against their fleet of original boats and, despite having to grapple with very interesting tides, John and Robbie took overall honours. The Trophies, which are returned to the Club at the end of the year, can be awarded to both owners or their crews and to those chartering yachts. An engraved glass will also be presented as a lasting record of the Trophy awarded. The criteria for award are:

- Seamanship Trophy awarded for a feat of seamanship or navigation by a club member. A board listing the winners is displayed in the club.
- XII Bar Blues Trophy awarded to encourage and reward the use of modern technologies in the production of cruising yachts by creating blogs for a particular cruise.
- John and Angie Bailey Trophy awarded for a lifetime achievement in sailing.
- Cadiz Cup awarded for a significant and demanding cruise under sail.
- Quains Cup awarded for a significant cruise under sail.
- Channel Trophy awarded for consistent support over the cruising season of rallies organised by the Cruising Sub-Committee; can be awarded to both sailing yachts or motor cruisers.
- Senior Brownlow Cup awarded for the best narrative submitted with a Cruising Award proforma (available from left hand menu) by either a sailing yacht or motor cruiser.
- · Fen Dawn Cup awarded to a motor cruiser for a significant cruise.
- Junior Brownlow Cup awarded to a young family who have undertaken a challenging cruise, taking into account the age of the children or to a member whether junior or family under the age of 18 who has made a significant contribution to a cruise either as a skipper or member of crew.

Wednesday 4th November: Traditiona Boatbuilding Around The World - COLIN PALMER

Around the world, traditional boats are built without lines planes, using skills and traditions handed down over the generations. The way we build in the west, starting with a skeleton of frames and wrapping them in planks is the exception. The great majority of boat builders start with the planks and put the frames in afterwards. The ways they do this vary greatly from place to place, resulting in a remarkable array of different boat shapes and traditions.

This talk will whisk you around the world, comparing and contrasting the different approaches and end up by throwing light on the evolution of boatbuilding in

Europe.



Boats in Vietnam

Colin has had a very varied career. He originally trained as a naval architect and then worked in yacht design and the hovercraft industry, moving latterly into renewable energy project development. In the middle of all this he was for many years involved in overseas development, working on helping to improve the energy efficiency of traditional boats.

This work has taken him to many countries, including India, Bangladesh, Vietnam, Nigeria and Madagascar, where he was able to study the great variety of different boat building techniques. He became particularly interested in why people do things as they do and undertook ethnographical research into traditional ship and boat-building with the Centre for Maritime Archaeology at Southampton University. He has presented the results of his studies at Maritime Archaeology conferences and they have been published in the International Journal of Nautical Archaeology.

By the third race the wind had strengthened which so the windward mark was moved further to the east, making for a very interesting and shifty beat. Stuart and Robert Jardine and Doug Rogerson were first, Phil & Jo Brewer second and, David & Fenella Lees third.

Stuart Jardine and William Norris scored equal points but on count back Stuart Jardine and team, by virtue of their first place in the last race, were first overall.

LR Scows

A dozen Scows sailed in company to Newtown Creek on the 3rd September for a picnic. The wind was light and from the NW which meant a broad reach on the outbound leg, helped by a moderate flood tide. The boats were hauled up on the beach to the west of the entrance and sandwiches and a selection of beverages were produced from the two supporting RIBs. The return proved more challenging against two hours of flood tide. By short-tacking up the Island shore it was possible to avoid the worst of the adverse current and, once west of Yarmouth Harbour entrance, cross the Solent and into Lymington River. Those tacking northwards earlier were swept towards Beaulieu before finding the early ebb on the mainland shore. The return trip took up to three hours but everyone enjoyed themselves.

On 5th September the Club hosted the annual Scow InterClub Challenge, a race for teams from local Clubs sailed in boats borrowed from WJS and our own Members. The visitors came from Beaulieu, Christchurch, Keyhaven, LTSC and the Oxford and Cambridge Sailing Society, last year's winners. Keyhaven and O&CSS tied for first place, the prize being awarded to Keyhaven as they had the best individual score. Our team came third. There was the traditional afternoon tea, provided by Gillie Pearson and her team of helpers.

The Monday Scow Autumn Series was sailed with the fleet divided into Double Handers and Single Handers as an experiment. A total of nineteen single handers took part as against just six double handers. Rory and Alex Paton led the doubles in both races with Dubbie Robinson and Jane Cook finished second and Jane Wilford and Elliot Kane were third. In the single handers Sarah Richard completed a very successful first season in first place with Jane Pitt-Pitts second and John Evans third.
