Dinghy park

Christmas Racing

The three festive sailing events after Christmas went well despite varied winds. A record 71 monohulls and multihulls turned out to race for the Setley Cup and Seahorse Trophy model yacht competition on Boxing Day, once again run capably by several of the Club's most experienced race team members. Setley Pond was graced with sunshine and a decent breeze, albeit from an unusual direction, requiring ingenuity from the course setters and some wet feet for the smaller competitors. Peter Andreae Trophy

The next day the wind went away, so the 19 young competitors between 8 and 16 years turned up to race, the largest number for many years battled it out in the Club's rowing tenders. PRO Stuart Jardine set a course was from the Club's smart new pontoon across to marks on the other side of the river and back. The racing was often close but many oars went overboard and the number of crabs caught would have fed the assembled helpers and supporters. Most competitors were very tired after their heats but the fitness of the finalists was impressive. Two final heats produced a clear winner.

Winner of the Peter Andreae Trophy (A silver model of a Lymington Scow) - Tim Hire 2nd – Annabel Vines, 3rd – Sam Webb, 4th – Vita Heathcote crewed by Dirk Rogers and 5th – Lola Mordant. All the competitors received a fair cash prize from the fund left to the Club for this event in the name of Peter Andreae.

Thanks are due to all the volunteers who came down to help particularly those in the registration office - Jane Clegg, Jane Pitt-Pitts and Katie Ould - sorting out the boat selection, the results and a fair distribution of the cash prizes. The two RIB crews covering mark laying, safety and keeping the river traffic clear. Ann Brunskill on radio and ferry traffic and the five volunteers on the Club pontoon ensuring the right crew was aboard each dinghy and released at the same time and returned safely to the correct position at the finish. Plus a guest appearance from Robin Markes as the PRO's right hand man.





Penguin Trophy

The second of the RLymYC's post-Christmas sailing events is the Penguin Trophy sailed in WJS Scows. There are no age limits except that any person under the age of 8 on 31 December 2016, must be accompanied by a person over 18 on 31 December 2016. Boats must be raced double-handed.

Viewing the flat surface and lack of wind, Race officer Vince Sutherland decreed a 30 minute postponement. Patience was rewarded and the wind filled in from the east at 10 - 12 kts. The hardy supporters on the pontoon had an excellent view of the techniques and tactics employed by the competitors as they raced round from the start to the south of the Club pontoon, across and up the river

to a mark off the eastern moorings and back to the finish at the entrance to the slipway. The best two from each of the sets of two heats produced six hot shots for the final. Nik Froud and Freddie Fitzsimmons won the Penguin Trophy convincingly (presented by Barry Dunning, in his role as Mayor of Lymington) with Sarah and George Richards second and Ailsa and Sean Muskett third. There were seasonal prizes for all the finalists and mulled wine, mince pies, shortbread and chocolate biscuits were enjoyed by all.

Training

First Aid Courses, Sunday 15th January and Saturday 5th March

The course runs from 09:00hrs to 16:30 approx. in the Island Room.

COURSE INFORMATION

Our one-day course covers all the usual first aid subjects, but from a boating perspective. It is aimed at anyone who goes afloat, whether on inland waters, rivers, estuaries or on cross channel passages.

In a medical emergency a little first aid knowledge and immediate action can save lives, especially in remote locations. This one-day course is designed to provide a working knowledge of first aid for people using small craft and to support skippers.

It fulfils the requirements for; professional skippers of small craft working within 60 miles of a safe haven, including Boatmasters; the Senior First Aid certificate needed by offshore racers subject to ISAF's regulations on first aid training (OSR 4.08.4). The course is recommended by the MCA and HSE.

The subjects specific to boating include: the recovery position in a confined space, CPR, including the drowning protocol, cold shock and hypothermia from immersion and/or exposure, seasickness and dehydration, medical assistance or advice by VHF, helicopter rescue.

To book onto a course you will need to fill in the application form and return it to the Club along with your payment. The course is £50 for Members and £70 for non-Members.
