Kitchen Project

Salad Bar and Kitchen refurbishment project: normal service during the first phase of the refurbishment

As we go through January with the prospect of miserable weather for the foreseeable future, Club Chef, Matt Doe, has given us the recipe for one of his winter warmers that delight us at the Club and what better ingredient to use than venison - something on our doorstep. Venison is a very lean red meat, lower in fat, calories and cholesterol than other red meat so it's not only delicious but very healthy. Cooked slowly, it is perfect for those cold winter nights sat in front of the fire.

Matt's Recipe for Venison Casserole

Ingredients

For the stew

800g of diced venison (shoulder or haunch)

Olive oil for frying

Sea salt and black pepper

2 white onions, diced

For the sauce

500 ml red wine

Sprig of thyme

Sprig of rosemary

2 bay leaves

3 cloves of garlic, finely chopped 250 ml fresh beef stock (bought if you don't have time to make it)

2 tablespoons redcurrant jelly

To finish

2 tablespoons cornflour and water to mix

Method

Preheat the oven to 150°C. Place the red wine, thyme, rosemary and bay leaves in a saucepan and reduce by half. Add the beef stock and redcurrant jelly and cook on a low heat until the redcurrant jelly has melted.

In a separate frying pan heat the oil and seal the diced venison in small batches to ensure they get a nice brown colour on them. This is important to bring out the flavour. When coloured remove from the pan season with sea salt and freshly milled black pepper and keep on one side with any pan juices. Using the same pan add a little more oil and gently fry the onions until they are starting to become translucent, then add the garlic and cook for a further minute.

Place the venison and onions in an ovenproof dish, pour over the sauce and put the lid on. Put the dish into the preheated oven and cook for 2½ to 3 hours until the meat is tender. When the venison is cooked, remove from the oven and if necessary thicken the sauce with a paste of cornflour mixed with cold water to the required consistency.

Check seasoning and serve with mashed potato and steamed broccoli. Delicious!

Wines

Two new Special Section wines for you to try

First we have a good Muscadet Cuvée des Croix Blanches, Loire Valley. At 11.5% it is on the less alcoholic side which we think will suit many, though it is perhaps a wine best accompanied with food. Majestic's tasting notes for this wine are: "Bright, clear with yellow reflections. A light citrus character on the nose with floral touches. The palate is crisp and clean with a fine texture and subtle spritz." While it's not 'sur lie', we thought it good and it will take the place of The Ned Sauvignon Blanc as stocks run out, though doubtless we'll get The Ned back sooner or later.

The Baron de Baussac will be replaced by a really excellent La Plata Malbec from Argentina at 12.5%. Majestic says: "Deep ruby coloured with smoky black fruits of cassis, blackberry and spice. The wine has a concentrated richly textured palate with soft tannins and long finish." Both wines will sell at the usual Special Section price by the glass and by the bottle.

Marine Conservation Zones

Newtown Anchorage Update and request for comments

DEFRA has now published its consultation document on Marine Conservation Zones but has deferred any decision on how to tackle the various zones in and around (amongst others) the Solent and Studland Bay. However this doesn't mean we can put up our feet and relax, far from it. There is a possibility that the East Coast sites may not be as controversial as those on the South Coast and that DEFRA may be testing how changes can be implemented on the less debatable sites before tackling the rest.

The link to the DEFRA report and some initial comments, both as regards the RYA's general approach and specific to Newtown are available on the RYA website. It's a lot of reading, but the better we all understand DEFRA's approach the better the Club, the RYA and we as individuals will be able to argue our case. The RYA would greatly appreciate feedback on the effectiveness or otherwise of their website and its content so as to help them improve their response. An internal RYA planning meeting is being held on 16th January to discuss strategy. Please visit the website and, if you are happy with the RYA recommendations please tell me. Equally if you are not happy give me your comments. These should be emailed to me by 11th January 2013 and will be passed on to the RYA for their meeting on the 16th January.

Needles Relief 2012

Sixteen boats in two classes competed in the annual 'friendly' race. The staggered start from the river start line dispersed the fleet safely down the river to where the race really started. With a flood tide and a 20 to 25 kt SW breeze the fleet tacked along the shore to Hurst Spit. Unfortunately in Class 1 Bob Baker's Brightwork ran aground when well placed, letting Jelly Baby, Jibe and Jitterbug come to the front. Negotiating Hurst Spit successfully with the adverse tide was where the race was won and lost with two boats unfortunately colliding at

this point. The reach to North Head and back was were Jitterbug passed Jibe, but neither of them caught Jelly Baby. From Hurst spinnakers were set for a fast run to the finish of the Royal Solent YC.. In spite of a dramatic broach in front of the Royal Solent Yacht club Jelly Baby held on to win the race.

In Class 2 Kevin Podger in Pallas Athene tried too hard to eke out his meagre one minute's head start over David Houlton's Elinor and the following cavalcade of Unity, Zarik and Aquaholic on the downtide leg to Solent Bank. The fierce tide made the spinnaker reach a little too fine, prompting some female squeals and a hasty drop! Richard Truscott in Unity and Jeremy Vines in Pickle put in neat gybes and the long beat against the tide allowed the bigger boats to stretch their legs. The tide was still running so strongly past Lymington Bank that there was hardly enough time to work up a thirst before the finish line rushed up and it was all over. Unity won by nearly four minutes from Pickle and Zarik, with Pallas Athene, Eilinor, Solo, Aquaholic, Contessa Catherine and Ocean Lore following shortly after.

Dinghies

Dinghy Park - Annual Maintenance Saturday 19th January

For those with a dinghy in the Dinghy Park, don't forget that the annual maintenance is on Saturday morning the 19th January from 0930 am to 1230 pm. It is basically gardening - picking up weeds, leaves etc plus some pruning and spreading gravel into holes. Many hands make light work. Setley Pond - Boxing Day

There were three consecutive days of exciting small-boat racing after Christmas. On Boxing Day almost 50 model yachts and their owners

assembled for the annual Setley Cup together with a large crowd of spectators. The event was organised by several of the Club's top race team, including a highly experienced rescue team on the pond. Boats are built to a simple box rule (often from scratch on Christmas day): 66cm long, 0.5 square metres of sail and no stored power or radio control, and are launched by under-16s. A good proportion of the boats made it to the other side of the

pond, which proved a problem for their owners as the car park was flooded to welly depth so getting

to the other side in time was tricky. Annabel Hutchinson's Skittle Boat, honed with a new rig and rudder since it came 2nd last year, won the monohull division comfortably while Emma Bennet's Wild Cat narrowly beat Daisy Baker's Tri Tube in the multihulls. Peter Andreae Trophy

Ten of the Club's's young sailors braved the weather to compete for the Peter Andreae Trophy, which is sailed in Scows, kindly lent by their owners. Winds from the south west averaging 20 to 22 kts with gusts of over 30 kts provided challenging conditions. It was crucial to judge how far out in the river the wind shadow of the Club stretched as getting that wrong meant losing several places on the very short

legs of the triangular course in the river as several of the 'hot shots' found out.

The last race of the finals was very exciting with a big wind shift to the north combining with a gust of over 30 kts to catch most of the six finalists out; three capsized but showed their ability to right a boat quickly which many of the more mature Monday Night Scow sailors

watching would love to emulate.

Stuart Jardine was ably supported by John Evans, Robin Marks, James Walters and Ann Brunskill on the pontoon. Mary Ann Jardine and Jane Pitt-Pitts took care of

registration, allocation of Scows, results and calculating the annual cash prizes to all. Ian Jarman was in charge of boats on the pontoon with Bob Burney/Chris Knox and Peter Mills/Nick Eales and David/Nicholas Brunskill in the RIBs. Kristy Powell organised the seven loan Scows.

The next day was the Penguin Trophy for senior helms racing two-handed with a minimum combined age of 35. Richard Mason and Chris Sanders won both races in the final, which was otherwise closely contested with three teams tied for second place.

Several of the Peter Andreae Trophy competitors turned out for the Penguin Trophy the following day, keen to further hone their skills and show the older generation how to do it. Competition was fierce and the watchers on the pontoon had to move on several occasions as the boats skimmed past the end of the pontoon to the finish. The starts provided much entertainment, some of the pre start manoeuvres were worthy of the Americas Cup. The wind was less strong than the previous day and, although no-one capsized, a lot of water was bailed

out after some of the mark roundings, leading at least one competitor to complain that he had so much water in his boat it wouldn't go fast enough.

PRO John Evans was assisted on the pontoon by Jane Clegg, Frances Evans. Robin Markes and Jane Pitt-Pitts; Ian Jarman, Stuart and Ado Jardine ran the changeover of boats and technical help on matters such as reefing. Bob Burney and Chris Knox were the mark layers with the support RIB's manned by David and Nicholas Brunskill, Peter Mills and Ann Brunskill. Cherie Dodd dispensed hot coffee and mulled wine with mince pies and produced another magnificent 'Penguin Trophy' Christmas cake which was enjoyed by everyone.

LR Scows


