Cruise Chesapeake Bay

The Cruising Committee are in the process of organising a cruise in the Chesapeake Bay. The Chesapeake Bay, considered to be one of the prime cruising areas in the USA, is the largest estuary in the United States: stretching from Baltimore to the Intra-Coastal Waterway and the Atlantic Ocean. It's a cruising delight with sheltered anchorages and historic towns and villages to visit, including Annapolis, home of

the US Naval Academy and museum.



We would link up with the <u>Sailing Club of the Chesapeake (SCC)</u>, whose members would be pleased to cruise with a party of Club Members. This would give us the benefit of their local knowledge and favourite anchorages and marinas as well as meeting a very charming hospitable group of sailors. They prefer to anchor wherever possible rather than using marinas and we would be able to join in dinners and BBQ's with them. There could also be the possibility of cruising on some of their members' boats. Our cruise would link in with the annual SCC "fall cruise" in the third week of September 2014 or with

the SCC annual, possibly more extended cruise in early June 2015.

However knowing that Members plan this sort of cruise a long way in advance, we would like views on whether this should be in:

- September 2014 (still warm but remote possibility of the remnants of an early season hurricane impacting on the weather).
- June 2015. Better weather (and swimming before the jellyfish get into the north of the Chesapeake). Also better to extend for more
 than one week. In June it could also be a pleasant diversion for any members returning back home across the Atlantic after the ARC
 or other Caribbean cruising.

As regards costs, <u>Annapolis Bay Charters</u> have a range of boats available including power boats and as an example the weekly charter rates for 2013 are: 37ft Jeanneau 4/6 berth \$3080 per week, 40ft Lagoon 400 Catamaran \$4620 per week. Flights to Washington/ Baltimore approximately £600 each return. There may be group discounts available for both chartering and flights if enough Members joined in.

Radar Seminar 6th April

The radar seminar held on the 6th April presented by Robin Pratt and Don Roper from Lymington Town School of Sail & Power was very well received. We had a brief history and an insight into correctly setting up the unit and the various ways that radar can help us navigate in restricted visibility as well as some useful tips on general use such as position fixing etc. Don stressed the importance of someone other than the helmsmen operating the radar particularly when using it for navigation.

The number of materials that do not easily reflect radar beams and make it difficult to identify a target came as a surprise to many. The presentation included several examples of major radar assisted collisions; leading us into a very interesting section on the IRPCS regarding the use of radar in restricted visibility, with demonstrations on a simulator



Day sail to Island Harbour, 11th April

We have already completed three races in a variety of conditions.
