Tom Rogers - Runner Up at the 2016 RYA Honda Youth Rib Challenge National Championships

Whittled down from hundreds of competitors, via 12 regional finals across the UK, last Sunday Tom competed against the 13 finalist in the 12 and under category, at this year's RYA Honda Youth Rib Challenge National Championships. Tom was not only representing the Club, but also the Southern Region, having won the Regional Finals in August.

With really tricky conditions, winds speeds ranging between 15-18 knots and plenty of tide, Tom drove two fantastic sub 1 minute runs, on a technically challenging slalom course but was pipped to the post by just 1.5 seconds to take the Runner-up National Champion's medal, 12 and under category. The overall junior category was won with a time of 0.58.31 and Tom had a time of: 0.59.81.

Tom said afterwards "Thank you to the Royal Lymington Yacht Club for giving me this great opportunity and to the coaches and other team members for all the support with training!

****The Sailing Club of the Chesapeake**

Founded informally in 1944 as The Annapolis Sailing Club - a club of sailboat owners and other persons interested in sailing organized to foster the sport of sailing. By 1949, membership had expanded geographically and the name was changed to Sailing Club of the Chesapeake. Their annual cruising schedule includes a Spring Cruise, a Rendezvous Cruise, a Mid-Summer Cruise, a Labor Day Cruise and a Fall Cruise. A number of Designated Rendezvous are scheduled at which member boats may be found, frequent invitations for Club boats to gather at a member's dock are extended, and occasional Mini-cruises fill the year with good sailing, conviviality and cordiality. Keen competition exists for the several perpetual racing trophies. All members take part in organizing the club cruises and events in one way or another. There is a huge willingness to muck in.

The Club is an active member and supporter of the US Sailing Association and the Chesapeake Bay Yacht Racing Association (CBYRA). In 1966 the Club sponsored one of the race days in the first CBYRA Race Week and continues to sponsor that and other CBYRA sanctioned events. Various members cruise outside of the Chesapeake on a regular basis, and extended Club cruises have been organized for the British Virgins, Greece, Maine, Tonga, French Polynesia, southern New England, the Bahamas, the Windward Islands, Canada's north eastern provinces and Croatia. Bermuda, the Intra-coastal Waterway, Florida, and the Bahamas are familiar cruising grounds to many of us. There are a number members who are also keen racers both locally and offshore. The Club contributes annually to a number of sailing-related non-profit organizations including the Sail Training Endowment Fund established by the Chesapeake Bay Maritime Museum.

Fleets

XOD



The XODs have enjoyed an excellent season with close fought and highly tactical racing in the Saturday and Wednesday series as well as some great racing and performances at the two Cowes regattas which are the highlight of the racing calendar. And it's not over yet, we are about to start the Autumn Series!

There are two major regattas at Cowes every year in the XOD racing calendar; the newer Classic Week, which is windward/leeward racing and Cowes Week, which involves two to three hour 'round the cans' races, where competition in the XODs is thought to be some of the fiercest and the Captains Cup, one of the most prized trophies in yachting. For these events as well as others in the Solent and Poole Harbour, Lymington boats are joined by the divisions from Itchenor, Hamble, Cowes, Yarmouth and Poole which makes for excellent competition.

Stuart Jardine in *Lone Star* enjoyed an excellent Charles Stanley Cowes Classic Week, leading the regatta after the first two days and finishing third overall. Rory and Stuart Paton finished fourth in *XL* and Rory won the new helm trophy as it was his first appearance. Unfortunately Paul Woodman, Oliver James and Simon McCarthy in *Ibex* were not able to recreate their first place from 2015 but finished a very creditable sixth. A further eight boats from Lymington took part in the fifty-two boat event.

Aberdeen Asset Management Cowes Week this year was a spectacular event with excellent racing in a fifty-six boat fleet. Eleven boats from Lymington attended included two under-25 teams who received funding from the Class. Two Lymington boats were in the top ten, with *Ibex* in fourth place and one of the under-25 teams, Nik Froud, Charlie Cox and Henry Lloyd Williams in *Venus* in sixth.

Back in Lymington, both the Saturday and Wednesday series were very well attended with a total of 31 boats taking part in the Saturday series and 26 in the Wednesday series. Average numbers were approximately 18 for the Saturday series and 16 for the Wednesday series.

It is often mentioned how competitive the fleet is and how many boats are capable of winning races and the results back this up. On Saturdays seven boats achieved at least one first place with sixteen placed in the top five at least once. On Wednesdays the numbers were eight boats with at least one first place and seventeen boats achieved a top five finish at least once.

Friday 2nd September saw seven Scows from the RLymYC loaded onto trailers for the short trip to Needs Ore on the Beaulieu River, summer headquarters for the BRSC. The occasion was the second leg of the newly-constituted sailing match between the two Clubs, both of which race Lymington Scows built by local builder John Claridge.

Conditions were nearly perfect (apart from the persistent light rain). The tide was high, the wind stayed just the right side of 20 knots from the SW and the current was fairly predictable. BRSC turned out 10 boats so 17 came to the line for the first of two races. First around the windward mark was John Evans from the Club with local Eric Williams second. Williams took the lead after the downwind legs and finished first with Evans second and BRSC's Jay Devonshire third.

The course was changed for the second race which turned into a tussle between Williams, Devonshire, Evans and Club sailor Dick Moore. Devonshire led at the windward mark from Evans and Moore. At the leeward mark Williams moved into second place behind Evans and Devonshire was fourth. On the upwind legs to the finish Williams took the lead and Devonshire moved up to second with Evans third. Close racing and enormous fun.

Back ashore the racers were treated to a splendid BBQ lunch prepared outside by some of the BRSC Ladies who bravely withstood the quite heavy rain. BRSC Scow Captain Rupert Scott thanked all concerned and presented prizes to Eric Williams and to John Evans and Jay Devonshire who shared second place. The first Laser 4.7 Ladder event was held at the WPNSA. It was also the first qualifier for sailors to make the 2016/17 RYA National Winter Squad. The sailors were tested by the mixture of weather. On Saturday the racing started in medium wind that increased by the afternoon and the last race was completed in a squall with gusts exceeding 30 kts bringing hail storm and torrential rain to the harbour. However, these conditions weren't new to the Lymington sailors and Zac West won the event by a clean sweep of 5 wins. Flo Nicholls was 6th and 2nd girl. Two weeks later a big fleet of 46 sailors travelled to Grafham Water SC and took part in the second Ladder event which was also the final selection weekend for the RYA National Winter Squad. They endured the up to 28 knots of gusts and tough conditions on both

days. The results were similar to the previous event as Zac West won the event by scoring four firsts and two seconds.
